This is in place to select, collect, align and integrate data and information in academic and administrative aspects of the institution. Information about admission and its procedure after CET, is advertised through website and forms could be downloaded and filled up. Though the admission register is manually prepared, the student data and information of all batches (1988 89 onwards) is computerized for ready reference. The college uses bio metric machines for daily attendance of students and staff and upload the same on the college website as well as other related offices websites every fortnight for information. All notifications related to study and teaching, are published in different egroups of students and teachers. In case of necessity, online meetings are conducted for staff and students during holidays. Ecredentials are used for semester examinations and eresults are published for students. During internship/practice teaching of our students, attendance and other related activities are etracked. 100 Mbps FFTH internet connectivity (BSNL) is installed. SOUL 2.0 software is used for library transaction, Registration of students in the Library is done through bar coding. Eresource books and journals are used under INFLIBNET</p>

NLIST. We also have online subscription of Dissertation abstract. We have also access to more than 3100000 (Thirty one lakhs) e books and 6000 (six thousand) e journals of ND/ NLIST.

Well maintained Laboratories: Science, Mathematics, Psychology, Computer and Physical Education are available in the college. The institution is located on the bank of the river Ganges in an enclosed area of 2.5 acres of land registered in the name of the college. The college is running in its own spacious building. Besides the building of the college, the cooperating St. Michaels High School building is also situated in the same campus. The twin institutions enjoy the open space facilities and other facilities such as play ground, canteen, dispensary and swimming pool. For Physical Education purpose we have physical fitness laboratory. All the classrooms are well equipped with modern technological equipment for ICT enabled teaching. We have installed a BSNL-FTTH internet connection with a Bandwidth of 100 MBPS. All the teachers and students avail the computer, WiFi and internet facility free of cost. Our computer laboratory is well maintained and equipped with 50 computers and related accessories. Psychology laboratory is equipped with latest Psychological apparatus and tests. Science and Mathematics laboratories maintained well with modern equipment and apparatus and tests. Library is partially automated and a total of 14318 books and 24 Indian and foreign are available and has a seating capacity of 100. Research materials, ProQuest CDs, Encyclopedias, Dissertation Abstracts International and other educational materials are available in hard and soft forms. Since 2011 we have Annual Membership of INFLIBNET NLIST with Information and Library Network Centre Gujrat University. The staff and students make maximum use of the same. Students Registration is done through bar coding. SOUL 2.0 software is used for Library transactions. We have more than 3100000 e-books and 6000 e-journals. It also render the facilities of photocopying and printing for staff and students.

Our college campus is eco-friendly with variety of trees and plants. This year also we have planted a number of trees in our campus. Gardening is included as part of our curriculum and students are taught Budding Grafting and thus making new saplings to plant. Environment Education classes are also included in our curriculum. Students are instructed to use Eco friendly materials for their daily use. A two day seminar on Environment Education for Sustainability is conducted every year at Taru Mitra Ashram, Patna an NGO for Bio-reserve. Seed bombs are prepared to place on the road and thus in rainy season the seeds are opened up and take roots. Rain water harvesting by making pits in the ground and terrace water is diverted to the same pits. 2 KV roof top Solar Power System is installed at the college campus.

The Context : During the period when Bihar had come to be regarded as a challenge, and it was believed that if you can achieve something in Bihar, you can do it anywhere else in India. Almost all the educational indicators in Bihar were negative. Its stagnation and drop out ratios were perhaps the highest in the country. Teaching is very poor and as a result learning outcome is very low. Students are tempted to use unfair means in examinations. Keeping in mind the objectives of starting this college and the crying need of the time to bring about a change in the teaching learning process and an effort to sustain the dropouts in the educational programmes we

provide Value Based Education. 3. Objectives: • To inculcate value in the students • To provide global competency • To give all round training that is intellectual, cultural, social, emotional, physical, aesthetic, moral and spiritual • 4. The Practice: Value based education is imparted through morning prayer, seminars on values, national festivals, religious festivals and emphasis of values in the classroom. For the achievement of our mission and goals the institution puts emphasis on the observance of punctuality, timely submission of assignments, well planned academic and non-academic schedules, records of the students related to cultural functions, educational trips, picnic, sports, debate, kavi goshti, essay competition, quiz, poster making, close observation of students, peer feed back, continuous evaluation, seminars on topics of educational and social importance. To emphasize context, experience, action, reflection and evaluation a seminar on Integral Pedagogical Paradigm was conducted in the beginning of the session . IPP also accentuates cooperative learning, interactive learning, group learning, meaningful verbal learning and use of advance organization approach as proposed by Ausubel. 5. Obstacles faced Since we pay adequate attention to admit students from the deprived sections of the society including women, especially those from the villages, it takes some time for them to adjust with the teaching methods, modern techniques and atmosphere of the institution , which they are not used to. 6. Impact of the practice: The students from the deprived sections who otherwise would not have got an opportunity to do B.Ed. are doing well outside after their B.Ed. and most of them have gone beyond our expectations. It is true that the best students go elsewhere to work and earn more money, but there are a substantial group who return to their villages and try to change the existing situation by their own hard work and commitment. The competency of our students have been appreciated by commissioners of Kendriya Vidyalayas, Navodaya Vidyalayas Principals of Public and Private schools etc. They have greatly appreciated our value inputs in our training. In the appointments of teachers by the Bihar government, our students have been toppers in almost all the districts in the selection process. Their ability to think for themselves and ask questions, do show tremendous improvement. Their honesty and integrity and their hard work is well appreciated by the schools they join. We are sure that they will treasure the values that they imbibed at the college and make a distinctive contribution to the society in which they live. Our teachers are conscious of the institutional values which they exhibit through their behaviour and this, in turn, shape value-based behaviour in the student teachers. 7.
